The Receiver's meeting opened with a call to order by Receiver, Dr. Francis Barnes and the Pledge of Allegiance.

REPORT FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Gregory Shannon – Good evening everyone and thank you for coming this evening. I am proud, once again, to continue to report on our beloved Chester Upland School District. Our enrollment continues to remain steady at around 3400 students and this is the week that we go through what is called the claiming process, where we will be claiming, officially, those students on our rolls this week. We know that our trend data tells us that our roll dips about 8% through our claiming process so we anticipate opening the school year with about 3200 – 3250 or so. This week in addition, from an instruction standpoint, was our benchmark assessment and all of our students have or will be participating in the benchmark assessment, so we are excited about that as it will determine our baseline data. This will give us our starting point and how we will conform our instructional practices based on that data. Next week will be re-teach week, so teachers will be moving along the curriculum as it spirals based on the benchmark data to re-teach those concepts to those students which did not understand during the first academic window of the school year.

From an athletic standpoint, I want to note, and if you will, and ask that you mark your calendars for October 31st as our Chester Clippers will be participating in our Home Coming activities at our A field against Academy Park and it will be a fun full day of fellowship and great things celebrating our athletes and scholars here in the Chester Upland School District.

I want to report that the CUSA Elementary School, which was closed on Tuesday and Wednesday for electrical challenges, is reopened now. It reopened today with the full academic program and it is back on line and we are working on a permanent solution. That concludes my report this evening.

Dr. Barnes asked the Superintendent to give a brief explanation regarding the student that got away from Main Street and an update.

Mr. Shannon – we had a student at Main Street yesterday who eloped out school building. Thank goodness we were able to find that young man and return him to school and return him to his parents. It was a concerted effort by the entire Chester Upland family. This entire building emptied and every single employee that we had, that wasn't rostered to a classroom, was on the grounds searching for this young man. Fortunately, pedestrians, along with Child Accounting Secretary, Jackie Browne, did find the young man and returned him to school and his family. That process is now under full investigation. We are looking at our protocols and our procedures to see where the breakdown occurred and how this young man was able to leave the school yard at Main Street Elementary School. We are taking every precaution to ensure that we tighten up or protocol so those kinds of things do not occur again.

STUDENT RECOGNITION – by Superintendent Shannon

With regards to Student Recognition, we have Principal McAlister from Chester High School here. Please stand up Principal McAlister (clapping). Principal McAlister has some students with her that we'd like to recognize, so can those individuals come up.

William Mallory, Donte Johnson and Shamour Young will give a short presentation on their participation in the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in Massachusetts.

PRESENTATIONS

The gentlemen from Chester High School named above gave a presentation on their experiences and insights while at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute in Massachusetts where they participated in workshops on robotics preparing them for an annual competition held at Drexel University.

*Principal McAlister- I just want to make a footnote here – when I think of Chester High School, this is what I see. No matter what anybody else says, **this** is what I see. What I see when all of these students have a 3.0-4.0 and they are all working with Dr. Jean (A. Jean Arnold) for application to the Gates Scholarship. So when I see young men, men of color, who attend Chester High School, this is what I see. And since someone else wants to write our story, we have to begin to write our own story. These young men are in the publication field, publicizing what is good and right about Chester, and what is **exceptionally** right about Chester High School. Thank you.*

Dr. Barnes also commented that for anyone not familiar with the Robotics Competition, it is an international competition where students have to build a robot to respond to a problem that they receive. Nobody is notified of this problem for a certain time. Everybody is notified in the mail of the problem and they have to assemble and build the robot to address this and if you want to see students who normally would not mix, assemble in an arena as if it were a basketball game, but rather than that, it is students academically gifted and students who have organized themselves around a problem, build a robot and scream and holler and jump up and down about the challenges that they are faced with trying to compete with other schools around the world. So a round of applause for these young men here. (Applause).

I know you are going to leave now to go home and do your homework. Thank you to the adults that have supervised them as well. We will have more information in the spring about the date of the competition. It is open to the public, so I would encourage our parents and community members to go, watch and observe, what these young people do with their minds.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Anthony Johnson, School Board President – Spoke about the Opinion in The Daily times regarding the deal with the District, Charters and PDE saying that it is the last chance for Chester. He doesn't believe it is a last chance but a beginning. He said that if the community unifies they can move the district forward. He believes that parent engagement is important and that the parents get the respect they deserve and need, since they are the ones who elect the Board and are in charge. He said that when things like what happened at Main Street happen, the parents should be notified immediately. When there is something important coming out, they should be notified like any other school district. That's respect and these parents deserve it because we've got competition in the Charter schools.

He said that school funding needs to be changed and Act 88 needs to be put back in play through legislation, it's a law.

He is looking for the Board to be transitioned back into power during December or June of next year. Because he doesn't believe that PDE wants to give it back to this local board they are going to stand up and demand that they get transitioned because eventually they are going to be back in control.

Parent University should teach a parent/guardian how to talk to a principal when there is an issue, how to first engage that teacher, because they come in hostile since no one has cared for years. Parent University is about them taking college credits; most of them can't even do their child's homework. They struggle with that and you know they are not going to tell you that because they are embarrassed. We need to know how to listen and help them because, if not, they will just go to the charters. So in conclusion, he believes that we need to involve the parents more, keep them informed and don't hide or cover up things and reach out to the Board members because they can help buffer these things.

Jean Arnold – Responded to Mr. Johnson's request regarding Parent University teaching parent/guardians how to talk to the school administration and teachers. Will Richan developed a class called "Parents First" and the whole idea of Parents First was to teach parents how to go to Administration, go to Principals and teachers and get answers to problems and we taught that over at East Side Ministries. We did role playing, care for the children, all that and that is part of Parent University and is scheduled to be taught.

Claudia Averette – It is a thirteen week course and we are in our third week, second year.

Dr. Francis Barnes – I would like to say that we have PTOs in all of our schools and as a matter of fact, Ms. Averette has organized a Parent Advisory Group that will meet soon. That is another way of building the infrastructure for the comprehensive communications mechanism. You are absolutely right, the more we communicate, the stronger we are.

Dennis Martinelli – CUSA has been shut down for the past 2 days. Ms. Averette asked him and some others to go over to CUSA because she had a feeling that parents would be dropping off children. He experienced for two days something that he had never seen in his life, parents driving by and practically throwing their children out of the car. Asking, "What do you want me to do with them; can't you watch them for the day?" Grandparents saying, "I'm only the grandparent, I'm not watching them all day." "Who's going to pay for the extended day care?" And he realized that the parents of this community have no idea what is going on here, because if this was any other district, every parent from that school would be at this Board Meeting asking questions. There is not one parent here from CUSA. And do you know why? Because they were so excited that CUSA was open today that there were 25 kids outside the school at 7:30am when they weren't supposed

to be there until 8:15am. They couldn't wait to drop their kids off. He had to leave STEM because Ms. Ferguson called him to come over to CUSA to watch these kids.

Also, he doesn't believe that our children are being served properly. It is only October and we are in survival mode not thriving. We can't even get a light bulb changed if one goes out because we can't get credit. These children are being neglected and are suffering. He doesn't see anyone from PDE coming here to help. He wants someone from PDE to come down here for a day and walk with him through the schools and the community so they can see what our kids go through just to get here and how we have nothing. It's almost impossible to teach or come to work with the things going on. How do they (PDE) expect us to survive? We didn't even have an extra building to house the children from CUSA. What if a major situation happens, like a fire. The building will have to be closed down, but there will be nowhere for those children to go to be educated. When is PDE going to see we can't survive? We can't thrive unless these kids have what they deserve. We can't even get subs to come work here because the companies aren't being paid. Everyone has gone beyond, but at some point all of us will be drained.

There was a plan with the principal of STEM to do a fund raiser for the 10th grade class to start a bank account for them so that when they become seniors, some of their dues could be paid, but now the fund raiser will be held so they can buy basic supplies for the building, like paper and to fix the copier and other things like that because we can't get suppliers to extend credit.

He asked Dr. Barnes to call the Governor and have him come down and see what we have to go through. He said that the parents are getting fed up and soon they will have had enough. If they want to shut us down, we can do that; we will stand in front of the buildings and not go in.

Darren Raws – He said that he was here on a positive note with regards to Champs. They started out 6 months ago with 90 guys and are now up to 125; all volunteers. They took 65 boys down to meet with Loretta Lynch in Washington, DC. One of the things they stress is either you are a Champ or a chump meaning all positive things, such as education, taking pride in yourself, doing positive things. This is an all-volunteer program we are doing with the young men and ladies. We work with Mr. Dawson and the courts and out of all of our young people we only have 3 on probation. You don't hear about all of the positive things that are going on over at the High School. When he came in to the High 5 years ago, it was totally out of control, but now it's awesome. One of the things he's done is reaching out to the graduated Football players to come back for Homecoming. One of the reasons is so they can give back, come back and speak to our students. So you hear about all of the negative things but there are a lot of good, positive things going on in our school. Another thing they are about to do is go on the Michelle Obama breast cancer walk. They are also doing a program with all of the senior citizens in the Chester area at the high school. It is not just in the school, they are giving back to the community. They have volunteers out in the streets that deal with the conflicts so they won't bring them into the school. They do their own fundraising. They are partnering with American Health Insurance Company and meeting with State Farm for a partnership. They did a program with Shop Rite with 25 guys and out of those 6 are going back for interviews. Remember that this is all volunteers; they don't have to sign up for Champs.

Mr. Raws moved back to Chester from the Main Line to give back to his city.
